Pathway to College and Commissioning

Iowa National Guard

The Iowa Army National Guard recently announced some changes in benefits for college students. Enrolled Cadets and students seeking opportunity to become officers can get college benefits from the IA ARNG without having to leave campus to attend Basic Combat Training (BCT) and Advanced Individual Training (AIT). The new program allows Cadets and students to join the IA ARNG as a "09R" contract.

The benefits they are eligible to receive:

- Federal Tuition Assistance in the amount of \$4,000/year
- Iowa National Guard Student Scholarship in the amount of ~\$9,000 (increases annually to keep pace with the rising cost of education)
- \bullet Drill and Annual Training Pay at E-5 Rate in the amount of \sim \$300/month (immediately upon establishing a contract with the IA ARNG)
- Monthly ROTC Stipend in the amount of \$420/month (once contracted with ROTC, 9 payments during the school year)

The tuition assistance and NG Scholarship pay the school – over \$13,000 toward your education! Drill pay and stipend are paid to the Cadet (over \$7,000 for living expenses).

In addition to educational and living expenses, the new Cadet is eligible for Tricare Prime Remote (healthcare) for the very low monthly rate of ~\$50/month for single person. For those seeking higher education after the bachelor's degree, the newly commissioned officer will be GI Bill eligible following Completion of BOLC II (non-scholarship lieutenants) and can use this benefit for a master's degree.

This is the first program to offer these benefits without having to depart campus to complete BCT and AIT. Students with zero prior military experience are eligible. Contracting with ROTC can occur after completing at least 27 hours of college credit. Entering this program and using these benefits continues to allow the Cadet to seek an active-duty opportunity.
